

# LOCAL GOVERNMENT'S ROLE IN ENSURING CLEAN DRINKING WATER

## COMPARISON OF DIRECT AUDIT COSTS



Estimated costs for the Township of Langley audit, as of July 31, 2019, are: \$250,979. Staff Time = \$219,543; Staff Travel = \$919; Other Costs = \$30,517. Other Costs include contractor fees and expenses as well as miscellaneous costs for researching the audit topic. Costs for the Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen (RDOS) audit were \$221,316 and City of Kelowna audit were \$302,410. These are final direct costs as of July 31, 2019.

\*Average cost of the audit reports published under this topic is \$258,235.

This audit outlines our findings in assessing the Township of Langley’s management of its drinking water systems. It deals only with the Township’s systems and operations and not those of private wells or other water systems, including the Greater Vancouver Water District, which supplies a portion of the Township’s drinking water.

The Township met most of the expectations included in our audit objectives and had made considerable effort toward ensuring the sustainability of its drinking water. There are a few areas related to these objectives where the

Township should consider improvements to help ensure the success of its drinking water planning and management into the future. The report’s recommendations focus on these opportunities.

The result of our performance audit process is a substantial audit [report](#), which we urge you to read in full, as it identifies good practices in some areas as well as other areas where the Township could make enhancements. This is the first of two reports under this topic on the Township of Langley.
